



Manuel Calzada is currently Director of Legal Affairs with UNAMID, the African Union – United Nations Mission in Darfur, Sudan, which he joined in 2013 after heading Legal Affairs in Afghanistan (UNAMA 2009-2013), and Liberia (UNMIL 2008-2009). He was previously a senior legal officer with the UN Interim Administration Mission in Kosovo (UNMIK 2000-2001 and 2003-2006), Senior Legal Counsel with the European Agency for Reconstruction (2001-2003) where he established an agri-business and industrial development financial institution, and Head of the Legal Office for Publicly Owned Enterprises with the European Union Pillar of UNMIK (2007-2008). He has consulted in various legal capacities for the European Union in Palestine and the Balkans reviewing key donor programs in property disputes and litigation for returning IDPs, and matters related to the Palestinian Banking Corporation. Prior to joining the United Nations, he was a commercial/corporate lawyer in Australia with Bannerman Ziatas & McKenzie focused on natural resources law, which he also tutored at Murdoch Law School. He was the Founding Managing Editor of the [Asia-Pacific Journal on Human Rights and the Law](#), *eLaw*, a pioneer online legal journal, and established the [Official Gazette of the United Nations Interim Administration Mission in Kosovo](#).

During 2019 he will assume a leading role as Of-Counsel with a key international law firm in Spain, and will be Visiting Fellow at the [Center for Global Peace and Conflict Studies](#) at the University of California Irvine. Mr. Calzada is a founding member of the **2GEDAR** network of peace operations and development professionals. He graduated from the University of Western Australia in Strategy, Diplomacy & International Relations; and in Law from Murdoch University. He has published in a number of fora in law, politics and legal history. His last joint publication was a chapter on Cultural Rights in [“Local Relevance of Human Rights” Cambridge University Press](#); and he is currently working on a Manual for DPKO Field Legal Officers, and a book on the Limits of International Interventions. He was admitted to legal practice in NSW, Australia; and New York; and as a Foreign Law Practitioner in the United Arab Emirates.
